- 1. In what ways does the imagery in Revelation 20 challenge or affirm your beliefs about the end times?
- 2. How do you think the battle between good and evil in Revelation 20 can be applied to contemporary issues in our world today?

Read Revelation 20

- 3. Jesus rules for 1,000 years. Revelation 20:1-10.
 - a. What is the significance of the four names used to identify Satan and his role as the father of lies?
 - b. How do you understand the concept of the first resurrection? Matthew 19:28, 1 Corinthians 6:2, Revelation 2 & 3.
 - c. How does Satan's detention reflect the limits of his power, the essence of evil, and the effects on human life when freed from his deception?
 - d. What lessons can we learn from the refusal of some to surrender to Jesus even when He will reign physically among us?
- 4. Please read Revelation 20:11-15, John 3:17-18, John 11:25-26, 1 John 5:10-12, and Romans 8:1. What are the implications for those not born again, as well as the hope and assurance provided to born-again believers?
- 5. Please read Revelation 20:4-5, 11, 13a, Hebrews 4:13 and Hebrews 9:27. How does the concept of perfectly justified judgment form your view of divine justice?

- 6. After reading Hebrews 4:13 and Revelation 20:12-13, how does the realization that every sinful thought, word, and deed is recorded in heaven, compel you to reflect on your actions and recognize the crucial need to believe in Jesus for your eternal life?
- 7. How does the promise of eternal life through Jesus' victory over sin and death shape your personal faith and inspire you to know what you believe, so that you are able to share the Gospel message with others?
